1.	Councillor Ben Stokes	Iwade Health Centre is a vital asset to the community. Many residents in Iwade and the surrounding districts are therefore very concerned to learn that the current permanent Doctor (who has only been in position approximately 2 years) is leaving the practice along with four nurses. There has been little stability in the professionals at the practice and the continual use of locums at the surgery means that patients are not receiving adequate continuation of care. Additionally, as with many other surgeries, it is very difficult to get appointments – for example 5/6 weeks to get an appointment for a lingering cough and it took 3 weeks for a resident's daughter to see the nurse. Understandably, residents believe that the reason the staff do not stay long at the surgery is that it is not being managed properly by the authorities. With the ever increasing population in Iwade, there is a severe lack of clinical care now and that will get even worse if the surgery closes. Thank you for raising the issues that have been raised by myself and of course the patients of Iwade Medical Centre.

I have been in contact with the CCG on this matter and they assure me that the issue of recent staff departures and the impact this is having on their patients is of paramount importance for them to resolve. The practice is currently in the process of recruiting additional staff and, I understand that Locum GPS, and arrangements to share IMH GP resources from another IMH practice are in place.

the CCG are seeking assurance from the Directors of Integral Medical Holdings (IMH), the organisation that manages the practice, that patient access to safe, high quality services is enabled urgently and to agree any recovery or improvement actions needed to get a permanent solution to the staffing problems at Iwade MC.

What is not considered is the impact on in particular children's health when traveling through these areas normally at rush hours to school ,or when other issues effect the road network whether it be accidents on the motorways or diversions of traffic or when major planned roadworks happen such as Junction 5 or Key street roundabout improvements that will be prolonged What will the council do to safeguard the health and wellbeing of the residents of Newington and other areas when at these peak times air quality standards exceed world and national health standards? What practices are in place to warn the public of these issues at particular times so they may avoid walking in these areas? What conditions are being placed currently on applications to help mitigate these peak time emissions and in particular around school children walking to school?
