# KENT YOUTH SERVICE CANTERBURY AND SWALE AREA OPERATING PLAN 2010/11

#### PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES OF THE SERVICE

Kent Youth Service recognises the core purpose of youth work as the personal and social development of young people through informal education. The Service directs its resources to the 11-25 age range (with a 13-19 focus) to enable them to reach their full potential and make a successful transition into adult life.

Enjoyment, Challenge and Learning are key priorities for the Service in its work with the young people of Kent. The development of negotiated relationships between young people and youth workers is a defining feature of the Service's work, and there is a clear emphasis upon the active and voluntary participation of young people.

Kent Youth Service seeks to develop a dynamic coalition with our partners in the voluntary youth sector and other partners who work with young people in the county.

Kent Youth Service is about supporting and encouraging all young people to meet together in a secure environment, to have fun and to form friendships. Young people from a broad and diverse variety of backgrounds will be offered the opportunity to gain confidence and the ability to face the challenges of life, to be active citizens in their community and to help work towards a society that is caring and free. To attain equality we must first address inequality and recognise the contribution each one of us makes to bringing about change.

#### **LOCAL CONTEXT**

2009/2010 was a very busy, challenging and exciting year for the Canterbury & Swale Team. We embraced Government, County and local initiatives such as Aiming High; Every Child Matters; Children and Young People's Plan for Kent; Swale Youth Strategy; Canterbury Youth Strategy; Integrated Support Services; Positive Activities for Young People; Kent Agreement 2 and Resourcing Excellent Youth Services.

As an Area Team working together, we held two Try Angle Award Celebrations; an Introduction to Youth Work Course; Kick Racism Out Of Football Event; Diversity Festival and held three training evenings for part time staff.

We raised approximately £5,000 for Swale Try Angle Awards and £4,500 for Canterbury Try Angle Awards from local businesses and agency partners. Both evenings were very successful and raised the profile of young people in their communities, receiving many positive images of young people in the local newspapers. There were approximately 100 young people nominated in each area and young people from youth projects, and schools hosted and provided entertainment on the respective presentation nights.

There were 17 members of staff from the area who signed up for the Part Time Youth Worker's Introduction to Youth Work Training Corse, some of which came from the voluntary sector.

The Alternative Curriculum Programme is managed by Mary Akers in Canterbury who has worked with excluded pupils from schools within the area such as Canterbury High, Chaucer Technology, Herne Bay High, Grosvenor House and Archibishop's.

There are currently 1510 voluntary youth organisations in Canterbury and 105 in Swale who are affiliated to Kent Youth Service through KCVYS.

The Canterbury and Swale Team take pride and pleasure in the County being awarded the National Youth Agency's Quality Mark in Youth Work.

#### **CORE SERVICES**

This service will provide general neighbourhood based and targeted youth work to support the personal and social development of at least 25% of the youth population aged 13 –19 in Canterbury/Swale. The core service is delivered through a network of 5 youth centres, 4 school-based Community Youth Tutors and 2 street-based and specialist youth projects across the county.

Other local work includes:

#### **Youth Participation**

- ♦ All Youth Centres in the Area have Members' Committees which meet regularly
- ♦ All YAG Meetings to date have had 2 14 young people representing centres, projects and the area and a young people's vice-chair elected
- ♦ Swale Youth Council met four times
- ♦ Canterbury Youth Action Strategy implemented
- ♦ Kent Youth County Council: 2,334 votes cast in the Canterbury area and 4,031 cast in the Swale area. Each centre/Project held elections
- ♦ Young People successful in a bids for over £100,000 from Youth Opportunities Fund
- ♦ Community Youth Tutors leading/supporting school councils

#### **Duke of Edinburgh's Award**

- ♦ 410 enrolments in Canterbury with 75 young people achieving Bronze, 2 achieving Silver and 37 achieving Gold
- ♦ 124 enrolments in Swale with 26 achieving Bronze and 1 achieving silver
- ♦ Community Youth Tutors have been accrediting young people's work through ASDAN Awards
- ♦ All centres and projects offer a wide range of curriculum activities that are educational, challenging, fun and accredited
- Three of the five centres in the area have annual awards presentation evenings to celebrate young people's success

#### **Diversity**

- Four out of five centres in the Canterbury & Swale area have a specific night for young people with special needs
- ♦ Two centres deliver work with travellers and young asylum seekers
- ♦ Successful Kick Racism Out Of Football event
- ♦ Support of County Diversity Festival
- Youth Club nights for Travellers in two of the five centres
- LGBT night in one of the centres
- ♦ All centres support and offer fun and educational programmes around theme days/tops, e.g. Black History Month; Aids Day
- ♦ Two centres have Young Carers Clubs
- ♦ Centres hired out to minority groups
- ♦ Girls only residential trips
- Boys only clubs
- KITE project [Afghani]
- ♦ Have LGBT members who are happy to be open about their sexuality within Centres
- Annual Diversity Festival at Canterbury High School

#### Positive Activities for Young People

- Positive images of young people in local papers, volunteering, gaining awards, reducing fear of crime
- Detached Teams with an Iveco Bus in Swale and Kangoo Van in Canterbury out 4 nights a week working in crime hot spots and areas where young people do not have access to a youth centre.
- ♦ Area Team has worked closely with Community Wardens to reduce crime. Community Wardens attend Area Team, YAG and Sheppey Detached meetings and support our work with young people by assisting us to run youth clubs, youth forums and consult with young people..
- Ray Featherstone and Mark Worf worked on two STAY programmes with Minster College ensuring that young people at risk of being excluded stay in school.
- Approximately 200 young people nominated for Try Angle Awards across both areas
- Each youth centre and project is open four or five nights a week delivering a full and exciting, curriculum-led programme of activities which are challenging, educational and fun.
- ◆ Approximately £300,000 raised from external sources to support our programmes through County Councillors, Lottery, Youth Opportunities Fund and local businesses.

#### **Leaving Care**

♦ 16plus service run by the Charity Catch-22 which helps young people aged 16 and over living in foster or residential care

#### Residential/Outdoor Education:

♦ Over 500 young people were involved with holiday activity programmes which included residentials to Swattenden, Bewl Water, Kent Mountain Centre, New Petra and Kearsney Campsite.

#### Partnership Awards to Voluntary Youth Organisations:

- ◆ Partnership working with City and Borough Councils, Police, Connexions, Social Services and Voluntary Youth Organisations ensures that our delivery of youth work is achieved.
- ♦ 152 voluntary youth organisations supported in the area through training, newsletters, grants and visits etc by Field Officers
- ♦ Kent Youth Service continues to have a high profile and is still in great demand with our partners in other Agencies seeking our advice, support, expertise and partnership in helping them deliver their targets in work with Young People.


