

CAP - what does it mean for you?

The Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) consultation has just begun and will help shape the future of farming.

The consultation will be open until 28 November and will aim to ensure that the new CAP supports British farming, the rural economy and the natural environment, whilst delivering the Government's priorities.

Many scheme rules are set out in the European regulations and there is no choice other than to follow them. However there are aspects where there are options on how to implement elements of CAP nationally. Where there is greater discretion on how CAP money is spent, there is a need to make sure it is spent efficiently, in the right places and where it adds greatest public value.

Financially, this year is likely to be another tough one for some farming sectors. I know organisations across the supply chain recognise the long-term potential of farming. Many will again be backing British farmers in these volatile times".

Kentish chalk perfect for its bubbling 'fizz' industry

Winemakers have predicted that England's flourishing sparkling wine trade could come to the rescue for many rural economies, creating hundreds of new jobs.

Vineyards popping up all over the South east are being planted with chalk-loving grapes that create champagne-style wines. These vineyards are labour intensive, and need many more employees to work on the land than would be needed were it being used for arable or cattle farming.

In an article published by the Guardian, it claimed that a hectare of land producing eight tonnes of grapes can produce 7,000 bottles of sparkling wine. If they sell for around £20 each, that means annual revenues of £140,000 per hectare.

Land area planted with vines has increased by 60% over the last decade, with some vineyards such as Chapel Down achieving international recognition.
