Western Area Committee meeting: Progress on matters arising – 1 December 2022

No.	Item	Background	Update on actions
1.	Bredgar and Hartlip Conservation Area Reviews.	The Area Committee requested that quotes be obtained for Conservation Area Reviews for Bredgar and Hartlip. These were considered at the September 2022 meeting and it was agreed to allocate £8,400 for Peter Bell to carry out the CA reviews and that the Graphics Officer would be producing the documents. This would need to be commissioned in the consultant he has capacity and will nee be confirmed with the consultant be awarded a contract. This way the allocated funds can be spent by May 2023, however, due to the resource crunch and a number of othe projects (AP1) being higher priority, the Conservation & Design Team recommend the documents. In March 2021 funding was allocated to a walking and cycling project in the Western area. The Active Travel Coordinator

		A virtual workshop took place on 18 October where the Active Travel Coordinator received input on potential routes from Area Committee Members and Parish Councils.	
3.	Bus services	A resident of Bredgar raised an issue about reduced funding for bus services and how this impacted residents in villages. She said that there was no incentive for residents to use buses which would reduce the number of cars on the roads. CIIr Bonney commented that Kent County Council (KCC) did not take the opportunity to use the Kent Science Park Section 106 funding to make a subsidised bus service viable by providing a timetable that would have benefitted the residents in the villages. Members moved a motion that the Chair of the Western Area Committee write to KCC about the effect the cuts to bus services would have on residents living in villages in the Western Area and request that the timetabling and routes of	A letter has been sent to KCC (see Appendix 2).
		remaining services were reviewed as they were not viable.	
4.	Brown tourism signs	It was agreed at the September 2022 meeting to reverse the allocation made in 2020/21 for applications for brown tourism signs to be installed in the Parish of Bobbing as they had been rejected by KCC.	A letter has been sent to KCC (see Appendix 3).
		Members moved the motion that that the Chair of the Western Area Committee write to KCC expressing Members' disappointment about the rejection of the applications and explained that the Committee felt the criteria was unhelpful.	

5.	Refurbishment of King George V Toilet Refurbishment	Cllr Sarah Stephen brought a proposal to the September 2022 meeting to consider the refurbishment of the King George V toilet. The Western AC agreed to allocate £5,054 to this project. They requested that an alternative hardwearing wall covering as an alternative to white roc be used.	The Buildings Manager advised that the project is planned to take place during the winter months when King George Park would be less busy. The contractor has been asked to investigate an alternative wall covering instead of white roc, as per the Area Committee comments. A further update will be provided at the February 2023 meeting.
6.	Conservation issues including ponds.	David Carey the Pond Warden attended the Western Area Committee meeting in September 2022 to talk about conservation issues including ponds. It was suggested that the Area Committee work with Mr Carey on a funding proposal to support the pond wardens and bring it back to the December 2022 meeting.	A funding proposal will be discussed under agenda item 8.
7.	Donation to foodbanks that provide a service to residents in the Western Area.	 Members agreed to allocate £10,000 of the 2022/23 funding to foodbanks that cover the Western area. The Swale Foodbank was recommended by officers. Members asked for the Bus Shelter Foodbank to be approached as well. For the foodbanks to receive funding they would need to meet the conditions below: Members would like the funding to benefit residents who live in the Western area rather than other parts of Swale. They hope this is possible as the foodbanks operate a voucher scheme so it should be possible to identify where people live. The Western area covers the following wards 	The Swale Foodbank and the Bus Shelter Foodbank have both agreed the conditions and £5,000 has being transferred to them. Monitoring reports will be provided at the February 2023.

A lot of residents in the villages do not have cars and bus services have been either reduced or removed. Members asked if some of the funding be used to deliver food parcels either to residents houses in the Western area or to pick up points in the villages. 	
8.	Proposal to support residents having difficulties purchasing alternative heating products.	Members requested that officers work on a funding proposal to bring to the December 2022 meeting which would support residents who were having difficulties purchasing alternative heating products.	A funding proposal will be discussed under agenda item 8.
9.	Rose Hill & Meads Woodland Management & Work Plans.	In March 2021 the Area Committee allocated funding to develop management plans. These had now been completed by an external consultant and there were £2,158.00 of funding remaining. The plans indicated if the tasks should be carried out by a contractor or a volunteer group. Two Friends groups have been formed, Rose Hill Woodland Friends Group and The Meads Woodland Friends Group. It was agreed that a Borough Councillor would sit on each Friends Group and they should provide annual updates to the Western Area Committee.	Funding has been transferred to the Rose Hill Woodland Friends Group. Awaiting bank details for the Meads Woodland Friends Group.
10.	Heritage issues	Cabinet adopted a Heritage Strategy and Action Plan on 18 March 2020. The Action Plan contains a programme of Conservation Area (CA) reviews.	Please see Appendix 4 for an update on progress.

11.	Youth provision in villages	At the June 2021 meeting the lack of youth provision was raised as an issue. Amanda Turner the Kent County Council (KCC) Youth Hub Delivery Manager and Rebecca O'Neill the Commissioned Provider of Youth Provision for KCC, attended the June 2022 meeting to talk about youth provision in the Western Area. At the request of the Area Committee a project proposal was taken to the September 2022 meeting for VIBE youth workers to engage with young people. The proposal was agreed by Members and it was also agreed to run the project twice at a cost of £6,930 in total.	The funding has been transferred to Brogdale CIC. Updates on the progress of the project will be reported at the February 2023 meeting.

Thank you to everyone who attended the Walking & Cycling Trails Review meeting, it was very helpful. The trails have been revised (see below) and the additional background and points of interest information added.

Over the next few weeks, we will be working with Tribal Voice Communications (TVC) to physically ground-truth each trail, checking the suitability, accessibility and attractiveness. The trails may then be tweaked accordingly to arrive at the final trails to be promoted. TVC will then create step by step copy for each trail, highlighting key features including points of interest and refreshment stops. Where appropriate, links will be made with North Downs AONB, regional and national trails. Once all this work is complete, TVC will be in a position to suggest a motivating theme for each trail.

As part of TVC's work, interested groups such as Newington History Group and Borden History Group and local businesses along the trails will be contacted.

Separately, I will work on the cycling trail and explore more cycling route opportunities.

Explore Kent will produce the final maps which will be used in leaflets designed inhouse, working with TVC. The trail leaflets will be printed inhouse too.

We will follow the Explore Kent process, so these walks can feature on their website, app and the Kent Connected app. Also being explored is the potential to make these trails available on the national gojauntly app.

If Members would like to join TVC on the ground truth walks, whether for all or part of a trail, please contact me and I will see whether this is possible.

Re: Proposed reduction of bus services in the Swale Western Area

I am writing to you following an issue raised at the Swale Western Area Committee on Thursday 1 September 2022. A motion was passed at the meeting to write to you concerning the impact of the proposed cuts to bus services and the impact they will have on residents living in the western area of Swale. The Committee also requested that the timetabling and routes of the remaining services be reviewed as they are not currently viable.

We consider the Swale routes to be vital to the needs of the communities and passengers they serve. The reductions in service will unquestionably have a negative impact on many of Swale Borough Council's strategies for the Borough, not least the emerging Local Plan and the Council's Climate and Ecological Emergency Action Plan. Set against a need to deliver against increasing housing targets, grow our economy and yet meet our ambition for the Borough to be Carbon Neutral by 2030, residents, visitors and those working in Swale need to be able to make more journeys using sustainable transport modes. Bus services are a critical component of this.

The withdrawal of these services will also disadvantage a number of communities in the western area, resulting in the demise in many areas of valued public transport connections for the rural population. This will impact on access to employment and skills opportunities, leisure and essential services, with a disproportionate impact on some of the most vulnerable, through reductions to scheduled services and particularly through the removal of the Kent Karrier service.

The reduction in services will particularly impact on the young. Many of the services proposed to be removed will impact directly on student journeys to and from schools, both primary and secondary. More broadly young people cannot, or are far less likely to have access to a car and aside from education these proposals will limit access to leisure, employment opportunities and further and higher education. Swale has one of the highest rates of youth unemployment in the south-east (currently 6.5% for 18-24 year olds) and accessibility to opportunities is consistently identified by Job Centre plus and other partner agencies as a major barrier to both skills and employment opportunities.

Project Proposal	At the September 2022 Western Area Committee meeting, Members requested that officers research relevant charities who could assist households who use alternative fuels in the Western area with their energy costs as part of their response to the cost-of-living crisis. After looking into this it was found there are no local charities who provide this assistance. Local foodbanks can provide fuel vouchers for residents in need who use pre-paid energy meters but not alternative fuels.
	The national organisation, The Fuel Bank Foundation, work with local partner organisations such as foodbanks and the Swale Fuel and Water Home Advisor Service to provide financial assistance to households in need using all fuel types including alternative fuels. The local partner organisations will assess the household seeking assistance and if they meet certain criteria, then The Fuel Bank Foundation can give financial assistance. Although The Fuel Bank Foundation would be happy to receive donations, they would not be able to use those funds for a specific geographical area, the funding would be allocated to any household in the UK who meet the criteria to receive assistance.
	Swale Borough Council (SBC) provide a Fuel and Water Home Advisor Service, managed by Swale charity Children and Families, more information can be found via this link Fuel & Water Home Advisor. One of the services provided by the Advisor is to give households advice on ways to reduce their use of energy and thereby reduce costs. As part of the service, energy efficient packs can be given out which contain things like radiator reflectors, draft excluders, LED light bulbs and timers etc. The content of the packs are tailored to the needs of the household. Each pack costs on approximately £50.
	Following discussions with the Swale Fuel and Water Home Advisor, assistance with the following would help residents in the Western area reduce their energy costs:
	 To allocate funds to the SBC Fuel & Water Home Advisor Service via the charity Children and Families so that the Advisor can provide energy efficient packs to households requesting assistance with reducing their energy costs in Western area. It will be possible to ensure this funding goes to residents in the Western Area. Get the message out to residents in the Western area that they can apply to receive energy efficient packs tailored to their needs. This can be done via the SBC Communications Team. Currently packs are distributed via drop off points and the closest drop off point for the Western Area is the Swale CVS office. If the
	drop off point for the Western Area is the Swale CVS office. If the Area Committee are able to assist with identifying one or more alternative drop off points it would be easier for residents to collect the packs more locally. They would need to be venues which are open most days of the week, have the ability to store packs and have staff in attendance to hand out the packs. The Western Area Committee may wish to consider the above proposal.
