Response:

Cllr. Ellen's keen interest in environmental issues is welcomed. This matter has been recognised by officers in the Environmental Protection Team, who are aware of the potential for historic contamination present on/under the former steelworks site. The playground is close to the former steel works but not on the site itself.

When the former steel works were operating the Environment Agency issued the permit to operate the site and controlled such operations as the depositing/burying of waste on the site to prevent uncontrolled deposits of contaminants.

The former steel works are one of our prioritised sites on a list of brownfield sites to be investigated under Part IIA of the Environmental Protection Act 1990. The extent of any potential contamination can only be established by visiting and researching the history of the site, and if necessary, taking samples. A site visit is planned in the near future and I will provide Cllr. Ellen with a written assessment of the outcome.
