### Response:

Knight, Kavanagh and Page (KKP) have now been contracted to undertake a review of our play areas, alongside the look at other open spaces. Initial meetings have been held internally, and stakeholders/residents will be involved through various consultations over the summer. The audit will look at the quantity, quality and accessibility of play areas, and enable a priority action plan to be created to resolve any issues identified. The strategy will set out how we wish to see play in Swale develop over the next ten years, and so bolster the Council's ability to argue for financial contributions from external sources such as grant funding organisations and developers. This, added to our annual maintenance budget and regime, will enable the improvements in the action plan to be delivered and any reactive repairs made.

In the meantime, we have some exciting new developments in the pipeline, with a new playground just about to be opened in Iwade, and three others that will be delivered thanks to section 106 contributions successfully negotiated by SBC, in the next year.

## Response:

We continue to fulfil our statutory duty to safeguard and promote the welfare of children. This is clearly evidenced through our recent S11 self-assessment submitted to the Kent Safeguarding Children's Board, which demonstrates our continued compliance in meeting the standards, and evidences the improvement journey we have undertaken. In summary, we have met the required standard in five sections, and partially met them in two. With only five outstanding actions, full compliance is anticipated by December 2016.

Having permanently increased our staffing resource to a dedicated, full-time Safeguarding Officer, this investment has enabled us to deliver vast improvements, such as enhanced safeguarding training including sessions for a number of emerging issues such as Child Sexual Exploitation, Radicalisation, and Modern Slavery and Trafficking; the development of a detailed monitoring system for the compliance of our contracted services; the improvement of internal safeguarding processes; and greater investment in individual safeguarding cases.

#### Response:

105 is the number currently in temporary accommodation, with 75 of that number currently living in self-contained homes that are available to them for the medium term while a more permanent home is sought. The number has been steadily increasing over the past two years, and is currently at its highest point. However, this picture is not unique to Swale, and certainly many of our Kent neighbours have similar or greater numbers of households in temporary accommodation.

### Response:

In March 2015 Cabinet agreed to provide up to £200k of capital funding to support the Mill project, subject to the balance of funding being secured to meet the full cost of the facility; that a trust is established that will operate and manage the facility to ensure sustainability of the project; and a business plan is provided.

The Council asked for expressions of interest to deliver these, and the current position is that it is awaiting the submission of a business plan from Brogdale CIC. Given the formal decision of Cabinet, until a trust with a viable business plan comes forward, the council is not in a position to release its £200k.

With regard to Faversham, the volunteer sports club that lease King George's recreation ground in Faversham sourced all of the money to make improvements to the site. An application for £1.9m Heritage Lottery Funding has been submitted by Swale BC for Faversham Recreation Ground. Match funding secured by means of a section 106 agreement from a nearby development was referenced in the bid. This is money already secured from external investment, and will be used for improvements regardless of the outcome of the funding bid.

It is not yet known if SBC have been successful in this bid as announcements are not due until early July. With the anticipated completion of the Open Spaces and Play Strategy later this year we will be able to identify the priorities for the future and as a result, alongside the finalised Local Plan, be in a strong position to lever in external investment.
