Whilst new litter bins have been installed in the last couple of years, I seem to have to constantly contact the Cleansing Team to report that Biffa have once again not emptied the bins and that they are overflowing. Not only is this a health issue, especially with regards to the dog waste bins, but it also doesn't help in keeping the ward tidy, with rubbish blowing out of the bins and littering the area. 		The Cleansing Team do an amazing job and get any issues dealt with quickly, but these problems shouldn't be happening in the first place, and surely Biffa should be following the routine set out in the contract and empty these bins before problems arise. Can the Cabinet Member please reassure myself and residents that this issue is being dealt with, and that Biffa are making changes to ensure that these problems don't continue in the future?		

Response: The Street Cleansing Contract is an output-based contract and is monitored by a small but effective Contract Monitoring Team. The Team cover a large area, and so it is necessary to prioritise workloads in order to ensure any problem areas receive regular monitoring, and resolutions to any issues are identified quickly.

In order to do this a 'hotspot list' is maintained by the Monitoring Team, and any reoccurring problem areas are placed on the list for regular monitoring. The Meads is one of the areas on the hotspot list due to the reoccurring issues with overflowing bins, and as such it has been monitored weekly by the monitoring officers.

develop and improve them. I recently met with one of our local MPs, Helen Whately, to discuss this, and asked her to raise the question of future play strategy and its links to social and health gains at a national level, so as to present the case of play against the demands on local budgets.

It is therefore imperative that we ensure the Open Spaces and Play Strategy, which is currently being developed with our consultants, is the best it can be. The delays have been made to ensure we achieved a good return on our extensive consultation, and we expect to see a first draft before Christmas.

Once we have worked through this and developed an action plan based on its findings, it is intended that it is presented to Cabinet in March 2017, together with the estimated costs for each element. Whilst there is no associated 2017/18 revenue budget growth bid relating to play areas, there are reserve funds in place, and the report to Cabinet will make the request for capital funds bids to deal with the outcomes of the review.

The Strategy will provide the evidence base for the Council to help secure further contributions from external sources as well as utilising our own existing budgets. Our aim is to ensure a fair spread of facilities over the Borough, combining the rationalisation of some in poor condition or unsuitable places with improvements to others. We will also investigate upgrading a site in each of the three major areas to create flagship/destination play areas.
