## **Response:**

The Council's Open Spaces and Play Strategy, which is at the final consultation stage, will provide a clear way forward for future investment and the priorities throughout the Borough.

A record of all funds received is kept with Section 106 contributions individually identified and deposited within a specific cost centre allowing monitoring of appropriate spend. Deadlines are often identified in the Section 106 agreement and officers have regular update meetings to help prioritise the projects that will be undertaken. Different factors such as ownership/transfer of the land and the current condition of the existing/nearest provision can also affect the timescale of delivery with some taking several years to complete. We also factor in liaison with other organisations such as town and parish councils and public consultation on larger schemes.

The FOI requested details of spend up until the end of the 2016/17 financial year. This is a constantly changing position as projects are completed and new ones come on board.

The Council has completed a number of large schemes since the request such as Thistle Hill Village Centre Play Area (£180,000), Iwade Village Park (£146,000) and has the Faversham Recreation Ground project in an advanced planning stage (with various S106)

agreements totalling £260,000). In addition a number of other smaller sites are also in the process of being completed having been procured through a tender process.

There are a total of 12 schemes making up the remaining play area element of the funding and 9 allocations making up the open spaces balance. These are being built into officer work programmes as per the above process.
