Initial reporting on the findings of the new transport model evidence will be reported towards the end of 2018 ie before Members are asked for a steer on the preparation of the Preferred Options stage of the review of the local plan and its scope will be in accordance with Dept for Transport modelling standards and will be validated by both Highways England and Kent County Council. The scope of the modelling will involve:

- a base modelling stage, to replicate the current situation;
- a 'do minimum' scenario which will model the build out of existing development allocations at points through the new local plan period with no major network improvements and no additional development allocations;
